Goals

The goal of GERMAN II is to provide students with an improved language skills in the German language in order to improve the communicative skills of writing, listening and listening, as well as oral skills, facilitating the insertion of the student in an academic environment abroad.

Skills

The objectives of the second semester German II Course correspond to that described in level A1 of the Common European Framework of Reference of the Council of Europe to promote language learning and facilitate mobility. The description for this Level of Reference presents the social domains of communication, communication situations, types of written and oral texts, communication strategies, speech acts, themes, specific and general notions that are expected to be necessary to the use of language in communicative activities.

Understand

Expressions and vocabulary related to aspects of personal interest.

Speak

About yourself and others. Ask and answer simple questions. Give simple information.

Read

Short, simple texts to find information about people, places or activities.

Write

Notes and short messages on matters of immediate need. Simple personal letters.

Modal verbs in the present. Order of words in the sentence with modal verbs. The "und", "denn", "oder" and "aber" connectors. Questions with "Wie viel". Possessive articles in the Nominative. The "Präteritum" of the verbs "haben" and "sein". The "Perfekt" of regular verbs.

Evaluation Method

The German - Foreign Language Assessment Scheme IV works with continuous assessment and consists of the mandatory completion of:

- (1) 2 tests (45%)
- (2) Final exam (40%)
- (3) Oral Participation / Presentation (15%)

The student is required to complete all the elements, these being: 2 tests, a final exam and a minimum of 75% attendance in classes in order to pass the course.

If the student fails one of the tests, he can only compensate for it with plausible justification, followed by the teacher's authorization. In this event, you will be charged 1 note value in the respective test.

The evaluation by final exam only covers those students who, by virtue of the law, can not be required to attend classes and consists of a written A1 level examination and an oral presentation.
